Met with Foster at club 24, to see what the committee had as we rent storage there. We have a projector, screen and slides. I'm proposing a budget of \$800.00 dollars for this year. Kevin and I sat in on the PI meeting Saturday Jan 5th as we plan to work closely with PI. Our committee is very small right now so will be recruiting members to join. Yours in Service, Heather

**Question:** When I was on the CPC committee years ago we had a \$300 budget which wasn't spent. Do you have an idea what the \$800 would be for? **Answer:** I spoke to Foster who suggested the \$800 to get started up and running as the committee has been dormant for a while. We will need pamphlets and other supplies.

**Corrections:**

On 10 Dec 18 I received an email from the Central NS Correctional Facility advising me that anyone who is going into the facility as a volunteer now must have a Vulnerable Sector Check done. The check must be current within the last 3 years. What this means is anyone not having this completed will no longer be given access to the facility. As of today we have one man and two women cleared to enter the prison. Therefore, since the 10 Dec 18 there has only been one meeting.

I have reached out to all current volunteers advising them that they must get a Vulnerable Sector Check done if they wish to continue volunteering with Corrections. At the facility a committee of three makes the final decision on whether or not someone is granted access. In the past it has taken a week or two for the final clearance to be completed. As of today I have received two Vulnerable Sector Checks for volunteers and have forwarded them to the facility.

The Vulnerable Sector Check costs \$30 so if all volunteers obtain one it will cost approximately \$600 that has not been budgeted for. Therefore, additional funds might be necessary.

It has also recently come to my attention that some folks seeking the check from their local police have been having difficulty as they didn't have anything from the facility stating they needed it. I have obtained a form letter from the prison for volunteers to give to the police department.

It has been my pleasure to serve as the Chair of Corrections. At this time I would like to personally thank all of the volunteers that have made it possible to chair meetings in the prison. I would like to welcome Troy as new Chair of Corrections. I will remain available to Troy to assist him anyway I can. Yours in service, Kelly

**Webmaster/Website:**

In 2018 we had a total of 58,308 visitors to our Web site. Monthly average of 4,859 and a daily average of 159. IN the past year our top visited pages where these:

- Updated various plugins we use in WordPress

- Installed and started testing new meeting list plugin. My first discovery? It has more functionality than what we have, including maps. But I we'll have to change the site design completely to accommodate for this new plugin. I'll continue working on this in the coming month.

Access to Gmail continue to be a challenge. Specially during transition to new members. Google is adding extra security that detects access to the accounts and flags them as suspicious. Sometimes even blocking access. The reason for this is that we are changing computer, phone, IP address from where we access, and this is seen as a fraudulent activity. There's only one way to resolve this and it's to pay for a professional email service. There are various providers and monthly price ranges between \$2 to \$6 US dollars per account.

Please note that in the monthly email which members subscribe to, I only include highlights from the newsletter; this is not the full newsletter. If members wish to have the full newsletter they must go to the website and download it to print at home.

**District 1:**

Hello everyone, my name is Steve A. and I am an alcoholic. I am the incoming DCM for general service in District 1. I am serving a two-year term from January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019, to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2020. I am an active member of the Back to Basics Group in Halifax. I have a sponsor who also has a sponsor, I have a service sponsor, and I sponsor other men. My sobriety date is December 6<sup>th</sup>, 1995.

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The District 1 General Service Committee is a key part of the connection between every A.A. group in District 1, and the General Service Conference. Through Kirk S., our Area 82 delegate, your group is connected to every other A.A. group in North America, and your group has a voice on every Conference agenda item, including what those agenda items might be. Consequently, not only can your group help the alcoholic who still suffers in HRM, it can, through the conference structure, affect A.A. services as a whole.

I am now going to provide you with information on just three agenda items currently being considered for this year's General Service Conference.

1. Consider translating the Big Book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, into plain language – at a fifth grade or similar reading level.
2. That work begins on the development of a fifth edition of the book *Alcoholics Anonymous*.
3. Consider the development of a contemporary and comprehensive new work book to study the Twelve Steps, Traditions, and Concepts.

The final General Service Conference agenda is scheduled to be released early in February. The Conference will be held from May 19<sup>th</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> in New York City. Work is underway on organizing the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual District 1 Pre-Conference where all groups in District 1 will be able to provide Kirk S. with input on selected General Service Conference agenda items.

Regarding the District 1 General Service Committee itself, ideally it is composed of the general service representatives (or GSRs) from each of the 26 groups in District 1, as well as four District Officers. The officers are the DCM, the Alternate DCM, the District Treasurer, and the District Secretary.

Lisa N., from the Back to Basics Group, is the Alternate DCM for District 1, and she is also chairperson of the District 1 Workshop Committee.

Leah C., from the Fresh Start Group, has taken on the position of District 1 Secretary on a temporary basis, and she has expressed interest in continuing in the secretary position on a permanent basis.

We have an opening for the District 1 Treasurer. If you know of anyone who is interested in serving in this position, please let me know.

#### District 1 Workshops

Workshops are held in District 1 every other month, beginning this month.

The topic of this month's workshop is "The Role of the GSR." This workshop will be facilitated by the Alternate Delegate for Area 82, Trudy D., and the District 2 DCM, Shane S. While the workshop is designed for new or returning GSRs and alternate GSRs, all A.A. members are welcome to participate.

The workshop takes place on Sunday, January 27<sup>th</sup>, from 1:00 pm to 2:00 pm at the George Dixon Centre, 2502 Brunswick Street in Halifax. I hope to see you there.

**Old Business:**

**1) Treatment committee: Marguerite Centre - Tokens**

In the December CS meeting, extra funds were given to the Treatment committee in order to purchase pamphlets and tokens for the meetings put on at the Marguerite Centre. A member emailed regarding a resolution which was made several years ago at the Central Service table that CS would not fund Non-AA-Approved materials, such as tokens. Do we have any thoughts on this from this table?

**Comment:** Having attended meetings there, I know that the tokens are very appreciated by the girls staying there. Thinking of the cost of the tokens and the number of meetings which are put on every year at the centre, I would guess that the total cost might be \$20.

**Questions:** How long are the women at the centre? Does someone manage and hold the tokens and literature at the centre? Are these women members of AA? **Answer:** The women are there from 5 to 12 months generally. The Serenity Sisters had been taking charge of bringing materials and tokens but are handing it over now - there is a place where AA materials are kept at the centre. The women are not members of AA but hopefully will become members. The meeting there operates like a group.

**Comment:** I feel strongly about continuing this practice - this centre provides an important service for women who are suffering.

**CS Chair:** If there are no strong feelings against this practice, the Treatment committee will continue to provide these materials.

**2) Forensics meetings:**

At the last Central Service meeting, there was a discussion on meetings put on at the Forensics unit and issues of safety which lead us to the question: Will we continue to put on meetings at forensics? Some of the concerns discussed were:

-there was a feeling the message was not reaching anyone

-members didn't feel safe and didn't have an awareness that guards were prepared to help at a moment's notice

-sense that as members we can communicate with another drunk, but not with someone who is suffering from mental illness and delusions, who is not in touch with reality.

-there is so much movement and chaos that is it very difficult to follow any meeting format



**Comment:** Perhaps it is not our responsibility as members to decide how much of our message is received, but only to share the message. If members are worried for their safety in that unit, perhaps they can choose to volunteer in a different capacity and leave the forensics meetings to those who are not worried for their safety in that environment.

**Comment:** I have a close family member who has worked on that unit in a professional capacity for 17 years and has never been harmed or questioned their safety.

**Comment:** I have had discussions with members who put on these meetings who have expressed that going to the forensics unit to share the message has helped them immeasurably in staying sober themselves.

**Comment:** If the meetings become disruptive, members can always contact the guards for assistance.

**Comment:** I know of individuals on that unit who get passes in order to go to regular AA meetings when they have a chance. I think this is an imperative service that we offer.

**CS Chair:** We will put this issue to rest and continue with meetings at Forensics as before.

**3) Hospital Visitation committee:**

Since we do not have a current chair for the committee, perhaps this discussion can wait until a later meeting.
